

Welcome to your St Mary's Career Passport




Your St Mary's Career Pathway is based on the Career Development Institute (CDI) and Gatsby Benchmarks. These are National Frameworks that schools use to make sure they are providing brilliant and effective careers education and guidance. We use them to ensure that we are giving you a flying start by helping you gain the knowledge and skills you need to begin navigating your way successfully through career choices and changes.

CDI FRAMEWORK

The main purpose of the CDI's Career Development Framework is to clarify the skills, knowledge, and attitudes that individuals need to have a positive career. A 'positive career' will mean something different to everyone, but it will typically include being happy with the way you spend your time, being able to contribute to your community and being able to have a good standard of living.

The CDI's <u>Career Development Framework</u> describes the six career development skills that people need to have positive careers.



THE GATSBY BENCHMARKS

The <u>Gatsby Benchmarks</u> are a framework of 8 guidelines that define the best careers provision in schools and colleges.



How the benchmarks are implemented at St Mary's is described below:

A STABLE CAREERS PROGRAMME	 The Careers strategy is the basis for the careers programme and is summarised on page 1 of this document. We use an online portal called Unifrog as our one-stop-shop where you can easily explore your interests, then find and successfully apply for your next best step after school. Our strategy is shared with parents, carers, governors and our careers advisors. You will take part in events like assemblies and special lessons with people of the world of work, colleges and universities. External opportunities will be sent out to you, parents, carers and teachers. The Careers Programme will be evaluated every 3 Years considering feedback from Students, Teachers, Employers and Parents/Carers The school has appointed a Career Leader who is a member of SLT and who has strategic responsibility for the school's Careers Programme (this is Mrs Parry).
LEARNING FROM CAREER AND LABOUR MARKET INFORMATION	 You have access to Careers and Labour Market Information through the Careers Programme taught in Inspire Time, through this passport and via the school careers portal https://www.unifrog.org/ As well as parental logins to Unifrog, wel provide parents and carers with at-least fortnightly updates on Labour Market Information as well as careers, FE/HE and Vocational events.

ADDRESSING THE NEEDS
OF EACH PUPIL

- We believe that you can achieve whatever you want to in life and we aim to give you knowledge and skills to work out what this is and how you can do this.
- We have links with local colleges and employers from a cross section of sectors and invite these partners into school to talk you and share their experiences.
- We help you challenge stereotypical thinking through assemblies and Inspire time and by ensuring there are no barriers to any opportunities offered.
- Your Unifrog account will help you curate your own personal record of careers and enterprise experiences that you are involved in and link to next steps for you to research.
- You will be supported and guided in making the right choice for you at each stage of your St Mary's journey e.g From Year 6 to 7, choosing Options in Year 9, your post 16 choices - whether that is with us or somewhere else and your post 18 choices.

LINKING CURRICULUM

LEARNING TO CAREERS

- Learning about careers, enterprise and skills learning has been woven into the planning for your subject lessons, links to the real world, education pathways education and careers.
- You will see and hear this through classroom discussions, problem solving, learning about real people in different careers, realising the relevance of skills in the subject to future career paths, classroom displays, school trips and visits and assemblies.

ENCOUNTERS WITH EMPLOYERS AND EMPLOYEES

- You will be given opportunities in lessons, assemblies, Careers Day and Enterprise Day events and external visits and trips to meet with local employers and employees from different areas of industry and employment.
- Teachers will talk to you about their experience of work and university.
- You will complete Unifrog activities to support this learning and to learn about national and international employers and job markets.

EXPERIENCES OF WORKPLACES

- You will be supported in researching and securing work experience placements in Year 10 and, if you stay in the Sixth Form with us, in Year 12.
- You will be given opportunities to take part in external visits and trips to meet with local employers and employees from different areas of industry and employment.

ENCOUNTERS WITH
FURTHER AND HIGHER
EDUCATION

- Speakers from local sixth form colleges, apprenticeship providers and other vocational pathways - as well as our own Sixth Form Team at St Mary's - will run assemblies and workshops for you.
- We will organise trips and visits to Universities for you.
- Universities will come to visit us to tell us how to apply successfully and what life there is like (we have had speakers from Liverpool, Chester and Oxford universities recently).

PERSONAL GUIDANCE

- In Year 11 and 13 Students appointments will be organised for you to meet with our external, independent Careers Advisor.
- This advisor will also be available to speak to on Year 9 Options Evening, Sixth Form Open Evening and exam results days.
- The Unifrog platform is designed to support you in making the most informed decisions about your futures.
- You have your own personal account and have been sent "a welcome to Unifrog" login to your Gmail account for you to explore and research.

To become an apprentice, you must:

- be 16 or over
- not already be in full-time education
- live in England



If you don't live in England, check out apprenticeship options in Scotland, Wales, or Northern Ireland.

As an apprentice you'll:

- learn and train for a specific job
- get paid and receive holiday leave
- get hands-on experience in a real job
- study for at least 20% of your working hours usually at a college, university or with a training provider
- complete assessments during and at the end of your apprenticeship
- be on a career path with lots of future potential

What is an apprenticeship?

An apprenticeship is a real job where you learn, gain experience and get paid. You're an employee with a contract of employment and holiday leave. By the end of an apprenticeship, you'll have the right skills and knowledge needed for your chosen career.

Levels of an apprenticeship

Each apprenticeship has a level and an equivalent education level. You can start an apprenticeship at any level.

Depending on the level, some apprenticeships may:

- require previous qualifications such as an English or maths GCSE
- give extra training in the English or maths skills needed so you're at the right level

At the end of your apprenticeship, you'll achieve the equivalent education level. For example, if you complete a level 3 apprenticeship, you'll achieve the equivalent of an A level.

Intermediate	2	GCSE
Advanced	3	A level
Higher	4,5,6 and 7	Foundation degree and above
Degree	6 and 7	Bachelor's or master's degree

7-LEVELS

T Levels are a 2-year qualification that you can do after GCSEs as an alternative to A levels, other post-16 courses or an apprenticeship.

They have been designed with leading businesses and employers to give you the knowledge and skills you need.

PEQUIVALENT TO 3 A LEVELS

T Levels are an alternative to A levels, apprenticeships and other 16 to 19 courses. Equivalent in size to 3 A levels, a T Level focuses on vocational skills and can help students into skilled employment, higher study or apprenticeships.



Each T Level includes an in-depth industry placement that lasts at least 45 days. Students get valuable experience in the workplace; employers get early sight of the new talent in their industry.



T Level students spend 80% of the course in their learning environment, gaining the skills that employers need. The other 20% is a meaningful industry placement, where they put these skills into action.
