Developing creativity in our schools






The C Change conference was a day of Pedagogy, Partnership and Power. A day of inspiration to explore cutting edge practice around creativity across our schools & community and St Mary's pupils were deeply involved. Our creative ambassadors have been exceptional all year with their development of creativity across the curriculum, but this day was where they shared their expertise and knowledge of what creativity is and how this can be used to develop areas of the curriculum and why it's so important for our young people.

Through an activity called table talks our pupils led questions with all the delegates debating questions such as:

How can creative habits empower young people to have a voice in school/community?..

How can we ensure that creativity happens across the curriculum, not just the arts?..

Creativity leads to wellbeing because...



Antonia in year 10 shared her question "How can we create creative partnerships between schools and communities?" Her opinion on this question was "Creating partnerships that drive creativity in schools and communities involves fostering collaboration between educational institutions, local organisations

and businesses. To achieve this, schools can establish programmes where students can work on real-world projects with local businesses, encouraging innovative thinking. Additionally, community organisations could offer workshops and resources to school, promoting creative extracurricular activities. Engaging parents, teachers and community leaders (e.g local MP's) in brainstorming sessions could also spark new ideas. By nurturing these partnerships we can cultivate an environment where creativity thrives, benefiting both students and the local community, as creativity leads to innovative solutions and a richer cultural tapestry."

As well as this year eight had a full history lesson, they were taught by Debra Kidd and Hywell Roberts (watched live by the delegates) who led them through a creative lesson on how and why Lord Lever built Port Sunlight to house the workers at his soap factory. They made choices and decisions on how to debate whether he did this for the good of the people or his own wealth.





Sian in Year 8 said "I enjoyed the lesson because it was an interesting way to teach and learn history. It was enjoyable and I can easily remember what the lesson was about. The way they taught was by acting out and describing what had happened in that time. They also allowed us to ask questions to Lever on why he used palm oil and why he built everything out of his own money. This is a lesson I will never forget."

The students were confident, engaging and were a credit to St Mary's. Sharing the power that creativity has on young people. One delegate commented "What confident and articulate young people we have, I am proud to have met them, and my future is in safe hands with these young people".

Supporting our young minds






Pupils exchanged one piece of uniform for something yellow in return for a donation to charity. Supported by a cake sale we raised much needed funds to support young people in the UK.


Department Focus: Maths

Numbers and knowledge

We are thrilled to share the fantastic strides our students are making in Maths. At St. Mary's, we believe that maths is not just about numbers; it's a journey of discovery, problem-solving, and building a strong foundation for future success. In this article, you'll find a glimpse into our innovative teaching methods, the engaging activities that make maths come alive, and the impressive achievements of our students. Join us on this mathematical adventure as we celebrate the joy of learning mathematics at St. Mary's!

How we teach maths at St Mary's...

We teach your child maths using something called the CPA approach. First, we start with real things they can touch and play with (that's the "Concrete" part). Then, we show them pictures or drawings to help them see the maths in a simpler way (that's the "Pictorial" part). After that, we move to using just numbers and symbols (that's the "Abstract" part). This way, we make sure they really understand the maths instead of just memorising it. We want to make maths fun and easy for them, helping them get better step by step!



Year 7 Autumn term

Our Year 7 students dived headfirst into the year by investigating the fundamental concepts of maths. From numbers and place value to addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division, our budding mathematicians honed their skills with precision and efficiency. Navigating the realms of fractions, decimals, and percentages, they seamlessly transitioned into the captivating world of geometry and measures, exploring angles, polygons, and spatial reasoning. The term also saw them tackle a variety of problem-solving tasks, also building resilience and creativity. As we celebrate their achievements, we eagerly anticipate the mathematical journey that awaits our Year 7 students in the upcoming term..

Year 8 Autumn term

In an engaging autumn term, our Year 8 students continue on their dynamic mathematical journey in St Mary's. Beginning with algebraic adventures, they delved into variables, expressions, and equations, establishing a strong foundation for future mathematical challenges. Their proportional skills focused students on the exploration of ratios and proportions, while statistical mastery equipped them to analyse and interpret data with precision. Geometry took centre stage as they navigated advanced concepts in 2D and 3D shapes, angles, and volumes. The term also saw them develop problem-solving prowess, applying mathematical thinking to complex challenges.

Year 9 Autumn term

Our Year 9 students engaged in a rich and challenging exploration of mathematical concepts. Focused on advancing their mathematical proficiency, they delved into sophisticated topics such as algebraic expressions, equations, and inequalities, honing their problem-solving skills. The term also saw a deep dive into geometry, where students explored the properties of angles, lines, and circles, laying the groundwork for more intricate geometrical concepts. Moreover, Year 9 tackled advanced statistics, mastering the art of data interpretation and analysis. As we celebrate their dedication and accomplishments, we look forward to the continued growth and intellectual adventures that await our Year 9 mathematicians.

Year 10 Autumn term

Our Year 10 students have mastered algebraic expressions, solving equations with equivalence, and calculating the nth term for a variety of sequences. Refining their skills in decimals, standard form, and investigating using the product rule for counting the number of possibilities. Additionally, they've excelled in finding the Highest Common Factor and the Least Common Multiple of numbers and been able to solve a variety of problems using this. They have extended their learning in statistics as they have interpreted, analysed, and compared data distributions, and presented findings in various diagrams.

Year 11 Autumn term

This year, Year 11 excelled in solving ratio problems within real-world contexts and expressing intricate relationships between quantities. The have built on their knowledge solving proportion problems, including best buys, currencies, and rates of pay, has been a focus, showcasing their practical application of their maths skills. Moreover, our students have investigated how to calculate the lengths of hypotenuses and shorter sides in right-angled triangles and applied trigonometric ratios like sine, cosine, and tan to find angles and lengths. Their knowledge of real world finance has grown as they confidently navigate percentage calculations for profit or loss.

How to revise for Maths...

Here are some helpful tips to make you more confident and successful in maths:



Organise Your Topics:

Divide what you have learnt in lessons into manageable chunks. Prioritise areas that you find challenging and allocate more time to those. Having a clear plan helps you cover all necessary content.



Variety of Practice:

Don't stick to one type of resource. Use your exercise books, sparx, past papers and revision guides to get a variety of perspectives on topics. Different resources can provide different insights.



Past Papers Practice:

Practice with past papers from previous years' exams. This familiarises you with the exam format, question types, and helps you manage your time effectively during the actual exam



Seek Help When Needed:

If you encounter difficulties with certain topics, don't hesitate to seek help. Talk to your teacher, classmates, or even online forums to get clarification on concepts you find challenging.




Flashcards for Formulas:

Create flashcards for important formulas, theorems, and definitions. Use these to test yourself regularly, reinforcing your memory of key concepts.

Healthy Lifestyles Days

Year 7&8 students get practical

In an effort to foster a well-rounded education that goes beyond traditional classroom teachings, we recently organised special days dedicated to promoting healthy lifestyles among our students in year 7 and 8. The days saw children stepping away from their regular timetable to engage in activities that focused on safety, first aid, mental health awareness, Internet safety and mindfulness.

Each of the days incorporated hands-on first aid training, where students learned essential life-saving skills. Trained professionals guided them through basic first aid techniques, equipping them with the knowledge and confidence to respond effectively in emergency situations. From CPR to wound care, students actively participated in simulations, gaining practical experience that could potentially make a significant difference in real-life scenarios.

Breaking the stigma surrounding mental health was another vital aspect of the day's agenda. Students engaged in open discussions, workshops, and activities designed to increase their understanding of mental health issues. Our guest speaker from Kooth, shared insights and personal experiences, fostering an atmosphere of empathy and support and allowed our students to know where to seek support outside of school.

Mindfulness sessions offered a welcome break from the hustle and bustle of daily academic life. Students learned the art of being present in the moment, practising techniques to manage stress and improve focus.

Given the increasing role of technology in students' lives, the day also included workshops on Internet safety. We addressed the challenges and risks associated with online activities, educating students on responsible Internet usage and the importance of maintaining a healthy balance between virtual and real-world interactions.

This initiative reflects St Mary's commitment to nurturing well-rounded individuals who are not only academically proficient but also equipped with the skills and knowledge necessary for a healthy, fulfilling life. It was an excellent experience, thoroughly enjoyed by both students and staff.

We hosted our annual Careers Fair on Wednesday, November 1st. The main sports hall was brimming with thirty-eight exhibitors which was more than double the number of participants compared to last year. Students from each year group had the opportunity to engage with representatives from a diverse array of companies, including well-known names like Airbus, DSG Accountants, and Stena Line. In addition, there were training providers and further education colleges like Wirral Met, Birkenhead Sixth Form, LMA, and more, providing insights into various further education pathways.

For those considering higher education, prominent universities like Liverpool John Moores, UCLAN, Lancaster, and Liverpool Hope were available to discuss higher education prospects.

Service-based organisations, such as the British Army, the Royal Navy, and the Police, were also present to elaborate on the numerous apprenticeship positions currently available and those on the horizon.

This careers event is a vital component of our ongoing program, designed to comprehensively inform our students about the myriad opportunities at their disposal. It also serves as a platform for them to connect with educators and organisations they may collaborate with in the future.













F1 In Schools

Silverstone trip

Fourteen Students from three SMCC racing teams had an unforgettable experience when they visited the world famous 'Silverstone circuit'. There was even a surprise visit from a former student.



In partnership with the Silverstone Museum, the students from years 9 and 10, competing in the Development Class of the 2023 F1 in Schools competition; were guests of a four hour educational visit as part of their research into what makes an F1 team work, the history and evolution of car design, aerodynamic technology and to get a feel of an actual F1 car, well parts of one that is. Upon arrival, after a smooth 3.5 hour drive, we were greeted by the Silverstone Museum welcome team tour guides. After some quick health and safety and general rules, we spent some time in the F1 shop admiring a worn Lewis Hamilton race jacket, frame, and signed, for only £5000!. Students bought some keyring souvenirs before heading down to the race track.





Down some steep stairs and to the left was Luffield Corner, a long sweeping right-hand bend where cars can reach over 180 mph and is one of the popular overtaking corners on the circuit, due to the corner's exit. Out on the track was a race day, with a large variety of GT cars hitting their top speeds around the corner. Students stood amazed at the designs and sounds of the cars and were reluctant to go to the next stage of the visit, to an old part of the track that was rerouted shortly after a driver accident in the tunnel. This old drainage tunnel at Becketts corner, was the reason why, in 1987, the circuit had to be reshaped to be safer as the driver Roberto Moreno, driving a March Leyland F1 car lost control, hit the barrier and was flipped upside down as he crashed into the tunnel. It took race marshalls several minutes to free him and he was miraculously unhurt. Now the tunnel is used for visitors walking between enclosures on race day, and there is a big mural with Lewis Hamilton's face!

Heading inside we went to a corporate box alongside the track for a workshop on all things F1, and it was here that the students, and Museum staff, were treated to a visit from a former student. Ian Penny was a former St. Mary's student who returned as an IT technician for several years. He then applied for a similar role to Force India and was accepted for his dream job. Ian moved down to Silverstone and built his career in F1 so that when Force India became Aston Martin Aramco Cognizant Formula One team (or just Aston Martin F1), he was given a role within a small team with an incredible responsibility, that the full IT system for Aston Martin F1, is fully operation track side, and is receiving telemetry data from the cars, and sending and receiving data to their team of analysis at their headquarters in Silverstone. It takes a full 30 minutes to get the system up and running and if he is late or if there is a fault, it could result in the drivers not getting out to qualify, which would cost the team a starting position and could potentially damage the chance to earn driver and constructor points.







After holding pieces of Vettel's car that came from a crash in a previous season, the students (and staff) sat down to eat lunch and fire questions at lan. The highlights of the questions came from Runa who asked about women in F1, specifically are there many and is it hard to get into F1. The answer was simply no, it is not hard, and about 50% of the Aston Martin F1 headquarters are women. Another interesting question was about the pathway to F1, where he admitted that he never went to college or university, hasn't gotten a degree, he simply wanted to work in something he enjoyed when he left school and he was ambitious, a story that many of the students could resonate with. Next year, with enough notice, will take us around the Aston Martin F1 factory across the road, a place not open to the public.







lan opted to stay for a while as the students were given free roam of the museum and what made it even more special, was that no other school had booked a visit, and no members of the public were on site, so it felt very much like a VIP visit. The teams got to race scalextrik around a model Silverstone circuit (That Mr Roberts is desperate to get his hands on), sit in a former F1 car, and play with all the educational games that made the museum a truly interactive experience. Getting tired, and towards the end of our visit, we finished with their 3D Cinematic experience. We've been asked not to share what happens, so just imagine being inside a VR machine, but without the headset.

To top it all off before heading home, and after saying our thanks and goodbyes, we took a trip around the corner to the Hilton Hotel where we walked up to the restaurant and onto the balcony, which happened to just overlook the starting grid. As we were picturing the start of the race in our minds, out came the GT cars for another session. What a great way to end the day. SMCC Racing will compete in the Regional Finals on January 30th after a visit to our manufacturing partner Aston University in Birmingham, where the teams' cars will be made, tested, raced and evaluated, all important information required in the grading criteria for the competition.


St Mary's Sixth Form

Raising aspirations




Music Department
