








































Department Focus: English


Love for Reading

Year 7


Year 7 have been reading Dodger by Terry Pratchett. It is a modern piece of literature based on Charles Dickens' infamous character Jack Dawkins. Dodger, a tosher, has rescued a young lady girl from a dreadful attack. After being named the Hero of Fleet Street for his honourable behaviour, he becomes famous, entering a world of wealth and finding out the truth about the girl he rescued. Pupils in year 7 have engaged in reading Dodger and actively investigated the girl's attack, through the eyes of a detective by using the events and clues given within the story.






Year 8

Students have been studying Victorian narrative poetry this half term. Students have read the poem The Highwayman by Alfred Noyes. The poem describes the love between the Highwayman, a criminal wanted by King George's soldiers and the landlord's daughter, Bess. Pupils have learned about the two characters and their romantic relationship which ultimately leads to their tragic deaths. Year 8 pupils have understood the concepts of narrative poetry and the use of dramatic monologues, whilst analytically writing about how and why poets have structured a poem to create a tense, dramatic and exciting plot.




Year 9



Year 10



Year 12 & 13

Our Y12 Literature students have been studying poetry from two different eras. William Blake's Songs of Innocence and Experience explore religion, faith, the imagination and society and its impact on the individual in the 18th and 19th centuries. Larkin and Duffy are two modern poets and our students have been learning both how to analyse their writing and how to draw comparisons. Our Y13 Language and Literature students have been exploring what is often considered one of the earliest feminist novels - Jane Eyre - and analysing a wide range of poetry from before 1914. They have now moved on to their next topics - a fascinating and moving non-fiction memoir about growing up in difficult circumstances in Manchester and learning how to analyse spoken language.



Exciting Mathematical Showdown!

On Thursday 21st of March, Twentyone teams from across the Wirral including two from St Mary's, geared up to battle it out in a thrilling maths quiz competition. The event was a celebration of numerical prowess, strategic thinking, and collaborative spirit. St Mary's were represented by A. Holt, C.Kavanagh-Phillips, R. Stevens, K. Austin, M. Armour, O. Sherwen, L.Gaines and M. Domanski. Hosted by St Mary's in conjunction with the Advanced Mathematics Support Programme (AMSP) the competition aimed to ignite a passion for mathematics among students while fostering teamwork and friendly competition. Each participating team, comprised of bright minds from various schools across the Wirral, bringing a unique blend of skills and knowledge to the table. The quiz encompassed a wide array of mathematical topics, ranging from algebraic equations and geometric theorems to probability puzzles and logic problems. With questions designed to challenge and inspire. Participants had the opportunity to showcase their problem-solving abilities and mathematical aptitude.

Beyond the thrill of competition, the event served as a platform for students to engage with mathematics in a fun and interactive way. By encouraging teamwork and critical thinking, the competition sought to instil valuable skills that extend far beyond the classroom. As the teams went to head-to-head, excitement was running high among students, teachers, and supporters alike. The atmosphere was electric with

anticipation, as everyone eagerly



History Department

Year 13 Poland trip

The trip was organised by Miss Stoneley in History and is part of a wider project that three year 13 students are undertaking with the Holocaust Educational Trust. We have attended two online seminars where we have learned all about prewar Jewish life, the Holocaust itself and have had the immense privilege of meeting a Holocaust survivor. The project will explore the contemporary relevance of the Holocaust and will enable students to become "Ambassadors" for the Trust so that they can disseminate the lessons they have learned in our school and community.

The Poland trip was a very valuable and thought provoking experience for us all. It was a long day, we arrived at Manchester airport at 4.30am and landed back in the UK at 11pm but we all found the trip both informative and very moving. We visited the site of the Great Synagogue (destroyed by the Nazis in 1939), Auschwitz Memorial & Museum and the Auschwitz Birkenau site. Students have taken so much from the experience and have reported that it has changed the way they view not only the history of the Holocaust but also how they view contemporary human rights and our role as citizens to ensure that the Holocaust can never happen again. Students are now working on their Lessons From Auschwitz project which they will be submitting in the coming weeks.









Art Department

KS3 creative making

Our Year 8's have been working on the theme of 'Social Justice' through art. Taking inspiration from the British artist *Grayson Perry*, they have been designing a handshaped clay sculpture. Using the 'sgraffito' technique, which is Italian for scratch, they are in the process of working into them with words and images inspired by their individual campaigns. When finished, they will be fired in our kiln and glazed. We can't wait to see how they turn out!

Year 7 pupils are also having fun and getting creative, having learned all about the Austrian artist and environmental architect *Hundertwasser*, they have designed their own building and are creating a final outcome from string and brightly coloured tissue paper in his trademark style. Once finished, they will be worked into again with oil pastels to give some depth and hung up for display in the art department.





















The trip departed by coach on Saturday afternoon and the group eventually arrived in the resort early on Sunday afternoon, following a visit to the ski hire to try on their boots and helmets.





Michael was impressed with the actors ability to transform between the characters' stages of life through their voice and movement "It highlighted to me how adaptable actors can be, and gave me ideas on how I could use the characterisation to create my interpretation of the characters."

MFL Department Morrocco trip



After a year of preparation, several fund-raising events, a 100-mile run, a 20-kilometre swim, and a music festival, Twenty nine St.

Mary's students boarded a plane to Casablanca via Frankfurt, flying over five countries in six hours. Hassan, our guide, was waiting for us at the airport. We then departed for the famous Cornice overlooking Hassan II mosque, the third biggest in the world.



The next day, Hassan surprised us with a full-day visit to Tangier, 'the edge of Africa', with its harbour overlooking Spanish Cliffs 10 miles from the shore. We visited Hercules caves, saw exotic parrots and camels, and witnessed 'CAP Spartel', where the Mediterranean Sea meets the Atlantic Ocean. before visiting the Old Medina, with its spices, scents, colours, local 'hustle bustle', and hundreds of stalls ready to haggle prices over many local items they had on offer. Later on, we had the privilege to visit the Mohammed V tombstone at the top of Rabat harbour. Our guide discussed the virtue of peace, and said that "any person living on Moroccan soil was a Moroccan to him no matter where they came from".

On the last two days, we drove back to Casablanca and carried on with our cultural experience: more tagine, more couscous, sweeter delicacies





day after day, and the compulsory mint tea after dinner. Pupils immersed themselves in local culture and were overwhelmed by the quality of the fresh food the Moroccan people offered us daily. We finally visited the Hasan II Mosque and enjoyed the tour. It's architecture and modern style, its opening roof, and the views over the ocean.

We requested to see Rick's Café, a landmark in American cinema, had a last meal in the sun, and finally spent the last Dirhams we had left in the famous Habbous, where our students quickly mastered the art of haggling.

Later that night, we booked a local Gnawa music band and sported our Fes hats, taking turns clapping, dancing, and enjoying their traditional music; this was certainly a highlight of our trip!

A big thank you to the school council, our head girl, and our head boy for supporting staff and organising collection for our security man, our guide, and our driver—the people who made this trip a reality!

Careers Programme


National Enterprise Day 2024


